

#### IT Centres Revamp



Two of the IT Centres in India are in desperate need of a refurbishment, which Indian Futures is raising funds for. Both centres need new windows, one centre needs new floor tiling and the other a new roof due - the current one has asbestos. The total cost for the refurbishment is £9,320.

The Centres offer free IT access to children in rural villages, who are unable to access computer facilities at home. They are taught basic IT skills by teachers trained and employed by Indian Futures.

### **Medical Camp**



In Vedanthangal, 180 local residents attended a medical camp which gave them the opportunity to visit a team of doctors and nurses from Chetinad Hospital in Kalamvakkam. The team ran health checks on the residents to test their weight, height and blood pressure, as well as opticians testing their eyesight.


From those tested, 12 were sent to hospital for free emergency cataract surgery, with 25 others placed on a waiting list for the operation.

## **Triangle of Freedom**



Indian Futures received funding from the Chalk
Cliff Trust to run the 'Triangle of Freedom'
Project. The initiative will compare children's
free-hand drawings from England, Iran and India
to answer the question of whether children feel
free to draw from their imagination or whether
their drawings are shaped by external influences,
such as TV. An art therapist will study the
drawings to look for themes or patterns identified.



The first 3 workshops were ran at Goldstone Primary in Brighton. It began with an icebreaker to explain the project to the year 2 children, followed by playing games to help them relax before asking them to draw the first thing that came to mind. The drawings will be exhibited on ceramic tiles which will be sold to the public and sales will go towards Indian Futures.
